



My pastor told a funny story last Sunday at church about an experience that he had while ordering some food at a restaurant during a mission trip to Belize. After studying the menu for a few minutes he placed his



order but the waiter responded in thick Belizean Creole "no mahn." Taking this answer to mean that item was not available, my pastor then made a second and a third request; but each time heard "no mahn." Being somewhat perplexed, my pastor turned to the local missionary who was chuckling to ask what he was doing wrong. The missionary explained "you must ask the waiter what is available on the menu," which my pastor did. The waiter replied in a matter of fact tone "rice-n-beans," after which my pastor and the entire team all placed their orders for the best (and only) dish on the menu – "rice-n-beans."

THE PRAYERS OF HOSPICE PATIENTS

I am certain that one prayer is not worth more than another. I am equally certain that God hears and receives all prayerful utterances of loving with equal attentiveness and care. But there is something special about the prayers of hospice patients.



The first time it happens, it catches you off guard. You visit a hospice patient, and upon leaving, you hear their voice following behind you, saying, "I am praying for you."

Hemingway said, "The world breaks everyone, and afterward many are strong at the broken places." People assume that hospice patients, closer to the end of life than we may be, are broken. But oh, such strength at the broken places they embody.

So many offer, "I pray for you and your family each time I see you." Richard, in his last days of battling cancer, spoke firmly: "My life is not yet finished, and while I am still here, I can still pray." One afternoon, Judith quietly reflected: "With each day that I weaken, I identify with those like me. I send them love and whatever understanding I am getting. They are not alone."

John reported that his depression and sadness was lifted one day while watching the news. He said, "I was so depressed that I could not get out of this hospital bed, but God came to me and told me, "Hey, you still can pray...so get on with it." So, I watch Fox News and pray for all the people who are in trouble."

One dear patient, Debbie, inquired one day what kind of wings she would have as an angel. After some serious reflection, she shared, "I am praying for the kind of wings I want, but I am also praying for all your patients, that they find the kind of wings they need."

When a hospice patient tells you that they are praying for you, it is impossible not to be humbled...to feel truly blessed...and to feel protected in ways one cannot fully even imagine.
