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Some Thoughts On Excellence:

The Bengali poet Rabindranath Tagore wrote:

I have spent my days Stringing and unstringing my instrument While the song I came to sing remains unsung.



I thought of this quote as I perused the many words the "excellence gurus" use to talk about excellence. These excellence experts use active words like improving, training, searching, demanding, striving, motivating, and doing. Their training systems have catchy phrases and snappy marketing spins, some of which are quite effective. For many, excellence is about all these actions: honing skills and practicing them, training skills to perfection, and keeping skills sharp.

All this is fine and good, but when I think about excellence, I think about the quote above. True excellence is not measured in the practice, but in the results. Many can keep stringing and unstringing their instruments to become expert in doing so, but few take the time to stop doing and relax into being. Excellence is in the being. It happens when all the doing simply falls away and the song can be sung. The finely tuned strings disappear in the melody which wraps itself around the listener, transporting them beyond the everyday into realms of beauty, touching their soul places. Excellence comes when the stringing becomes second nature and the beauty of the song can be sung.

What do Robert E. Lee, Ulysses S. Grant, Dwight D. Eisenhower, George S. Patton and Edgar Allan Poe all have in common? You may be surprised to learn that they all attended the United States Military Academy at West Point. The mission of West Point is to educate, train and inspire Cadets to become leaders committed to the values of Duty, Honor, and Country in service of our nation. All but one of these men went on to become famous Generals and two of them became Presidents. Edgar Allan Poe although a gifted and later famous writer was not able to meet the high standards of leadership required of all West Point Graduates and was expelled from the Academy.

Being a great leader requires more than talent, it requires a commitment to serve others with character, discipline and excellence. Of the 15,171 students who applied to join the West Point Class of 2016, only 7.8% were admitted and of those admitted only 953 graduated. The reason I am so familiar with these statistics is that my son Jared just finished high school and will be attending the United States Military Academy as a member of the Class of 2020. I am very proud of my son's achievement and applaud his hard work and dedication. Striving for excellence is the hallmark of a true leader.

Leading with excellence requires vision, commitment and dedication. Hospice of the Valleys has been named a 2016 Hospice Honors Elite Status recipient by Deyta Analytics, a division of HEALTHCAREfirst. Of the over 1700 hospices Deyta surveyed nation-wide, Deyta's Elite Status was only achieved by 3% of hospice agencies. In fact, only five hospices in California and 57 nation-wide have received this honor. Deyta holds the special recognition of Hospice Honors Elite, to honor hospices scoring above the Deyta National Performance Score on 100% of their quality performance measures. I believe this award affirms our vision to be a recognized leader of excellence in comprehensive end-of-life care and underscores our ongoing commitment and dedication to providing help and hope to hospice patients and their families. NOTES FROM FRIENDS




