3 Life Lessons I Learned from Being a Scrooge

One of my all time favorite Christmas stories is A Christmas Carol by Charles Dickens. My special affection for this story dates back to the fifth grade when I played the role of Ebenezer Scrooge in our elementary school Christmas play. I still



remember a few of my lines from that play and I would like to share some of the life lessons I learned from "being a Scrooge."

Lesson #1:

Happiness is a gift that cannot be purchased with money. The secret ingredient to happiness is gratitude, not money. Scrooge had money and lots of it; but despite all his money his was a sad and empty life. His nephew and his clerk Bob Cratchit were both quite poor, but as the story goes their homes were overflowing with love and happiness because they were grateful for what they had.

Lesson #2:

You can't change the past but you can learn from it. As the story progresses, Scrooge is visited by several spirits who show him the error of his ways. The first spirit to visit is that of his dead partner, Jacob Marley, who appeared bound by heavy chains and in obvious distress. Jacob explains that the chains which bound him were of his own making, forged by greed and that unless Scrooge changed his ways an even more ponderous set of chains awaited him.

Scrooge was then visited by the Spirits of Christmas past, present and future. He was terrified by the experience and realized that he could not change the past, but by choosing to be a different person in the present he could change the future. Although we cannot change our past, we can choose to learn from it and grow.

Lesson #3:

Giving to others is the true spirit of Christmas. There are numerous medical studies which document the health benefits of giving. In addition to promoting happiness, it has also been shown to lower stress and improve overall health and longevity. In closing, I would like to share the final scene of my short lived acting career:

"It was always said of him, that he knew how to keep Christmas well, if any man alive possessed the knowledge. May that be truly said of us, and all of us! And so, as Tiny Tim observed, God bless Us, Every One!"

- 4. You look like Santa Claus.


